Each day began with Eucharist at 7:30 a.m. followed by classes covering such topics as Liturgy and Church Music, Anglican Chant, and Choral Techniques. There were also daily lectures by the Reverend Dr.David Lowry on topics such as: The Changing Role of Religion and Spirituality in the World Today, Church and Religion in America, Being Religiously Authentic in a Plastic World, and Liturgy and Music in a Hyper-Media Age.

The rest of the day was spent rehearsing anthems and service music that were performed within the liturgies held during the week. Wonderful concerts were given in the evenings by the talented faculty members: Robert Simpson, Canon for Music at the historic Christ Church Cathedral, Houston, Texas; Kevin Kwan, former assistant organist of Saint Thomas Church Fifth Avenue in New York City and concert artist; and the Reverend Dr. David Lowry, Dean of Christ Church Cathedral, New Orleans.

Not the least important aspect of this conference is the rare and valuable experience of companionship and discussion with many fellow musicians.

## **Lessons and Hymns**

Sunday, August 23rd Thirteenth Sunday after Pentecost Proper 16 - Year B

#### THE SCRIPTURE LESSONS:

**The First Reading:** Joshua 24:1-21, 14-18. The people promise Joshua that they will serve the Lord because the Lord has served them so well.

*The Psalm:* Psalm 34:15-22. "The eyes of the Lord are upon the righteous."

**The Epistle:** Ephesias 6:10-20. St. Paul uses the images of a Roman soldier's armor to describe how to "withstand the evil day."

**The Gospel:** John 6:56-69. Jesus tells of the dangers He will face and some of his followers depart and leave. He asks his disciples if they are leaving and they say, "Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life."

#### THE HYMNS:

**Processional Hymn:** No. 517. "How Lovely is thy Dwelling Place." This relatively new hymn is a paraphrase of Psalm 84:1-2 written by the Rev. Dr. Carl Pickens Daw,



Jr., Professor of Hymnology at the Boston University School of Theology. Dr. Daw is an Episcopal priest and grew up in Tennessee as the son of a Baptism minister. He is pictured with this article. It is set to the tune of "Brother James' Air" composed by James Leith Macbeth Bain (1860-1925) a Scottish hymn writer known as "Brother James"-thus the name of the tune.

Sequence Hymn: No. 635. "If Thou But Trust in God to Guide Thee." This hymn is new to the Episcopal 1982 Hymnal (though almost four centuries old). It was written and composed by Georg Neumark (16 March 1621 - 8 July 1681), a German poet and composer of hymns. In 1640 he began law studies, but fearing the tumult of war, he took a position as tutor instead. This particular hymn was written for himself as much as anyone else as he feared war so much, "God will give thee strength whate'er betide thee, and bear thee through the evil days."

**Presentation Hymn:** No. 316. "This is the Hour of Banquet and Song." This hymn was written by Horatius Bonar (1808-1889) a famous Scottish cleric who was a prolific hymn writer and editor of a church newspaper. He wrote this hymn at the request of his elder brother, John James Bonar, in 1855, to be sung in Horatius' parish church, St. Andrew's Free Church, Greenock, Scotland. The tune, "Canticum, Refectionis," is the composition of David McKinley Williams (1887-1978).

Communion Hymn: No. 178. "Jesus Is Lord of All the Earth." This hymn was written by Donald Fishel born in 1950, a graduate of the University of Michigan, and a consummate musician. In a biographical sketch he writes that after college, "I then embarked on a career in music publishing and began writing the Christian songs for which I am best known. My songs Alleluia No. 1 and The Light of Christ can be found in the hymnals of the Episcopal, Lutheran, Methodist, and Roman Catholic Churches." The tune name is the "Alleluia No. 1" and was composed by him and arranged by Betty Carr Pulkingham (b. 1928) the wife of the Rev. William Graham Pulkingham an Episcopal priest who lived from 1926-1993.

Recessional Hymn: No. 482. "Lord of All Hopefulness." This hymn was written by Jan Struther (1901-1953), a woman poet and writer, born in London. and for many years she served on the editorial board of the London, Times. She died of cancer in New York City on July 20, 1953. Her hymn covers a person's day from morning till bed time. The tune, "Slane," is an Irish ballad melody.
