Lessons and Hymns

Sunday, September 27th Eighteenth Sunday after Pentecost Proper 21 - Year B

THE SCRIPTURE LESSONS:

The Old Testament: Numbers 11:4-6, 10-16, 24-29. This tells the story of Eldad and Medad who began to prophesy and made others jealous. Moses

was upset with their jealousy and said, "Would that all of the Lord's people were prophets."

The Psalm: Psalm 19:7-14. The psalter reminds us that the "law of the Lord is perfect and revives the soul."

The Epistle: James 5:13-20. The writer urges the faithful to pray for the sick and seek out those who have wandered from the faith.

The Gospel: Mark 9:38-50. The disciples get upset when they find a person casting out demons in Jesus' name; but Jesus tells them not to forbid such because anyone doing a good work in his name is worthy.

THE HYMNS:

Processional Hymn: No. 390. "Praise to the Lord." This hymn of thankfulness is based on Psalm 103:1-6 and Psalm 150. It was written by Joachim Neander in the last 17th century. "Praise to the Lord, who doth prosper thy way and defend thee; surely his goodness and mercy shall ever attend thee." The German hymn tune was selected by the author for this particular hymn and is intended to be sung by grateful hearts with joy and happiness.

Sequence Hymn: No. 709. "O God of Bethel, By Whose Hand." This hymn was written by Philip Doddridge (1702-1751), one of the outstanding nonconformist clerics whose practical and straightforward preaching attracted many in 18th century England. He based this hymn on Genesis 28:20-22 which records the vow Jacob made to God. The tune, "Dundee," is a melody from the "Psalmes of David." 1615.

Presentation Hymn: No. 343. "Shepherd of Souls Refresh and Bless." This hymn is from an 1832 Moravian hymn and the text is generally believed to have been written by James Montgomery (1771-1854). The tune, "St. Agnes," was composed by John Bacchus Dykes (1823-1876) for another Christian hymn but its strength of meter lends it to be used with this hymn as well. It relates well to the scriptural theme today, "Shepherd of souls, refresh and bless thy chosen pilgrim flock with manna in the wilderness, with water from the rock."

Communion Hymn: No. 707. "Take My Life and Let It Be." What better hymn to sing upon sharing God's Holy Sacrament than one of complete and total surrender? This hymn was written by a woman, Frances Ridley Havergal, who was the daughter of an Anglican priest who also wrote many hymns. She wrote her first hymn at the age of seven and suffered from extremely frail health most of her life. She is the author of four hymns in our hymnal and composed the music for "On Our Way Rejoicing" in the 1940 hymnal. The tune is one of over two dozen composed by the Anglican priestmusician, the Rev. John Bacchus Dykes. It's gently flowing melody reflects the offering towards God of our whole person: "Take my will and make it thine; it shall be no longer mine. Take myself, and I will be, ever, only, all for thee."

Recessional Hymn: No. 347. "Go Forth for God." This hymn, written by John Raphael Peacey, is new to this 1982 Hymnal. The hymn is assigned to the Holy Eucharist section of the hymnal as it encourages us to go forth from the holy sacrament in peace, love, strength and joy. The final verse comes from those who have tasted the love of the transfigured Savior: "Go forth for God; go to the world in joy; to serve God's people every day and hour, and serving Christ, our every gift employ, rejoicing in the Holy Spirit's power."
