SAINT JAMES OF JERUSALEM

This Friday, October 23rd, is the feast day of St. James of Jerusalem. There are several James' involved in the early church and it is difficult to determine who is who, but tradition has it that this James was the first bishop of Jerusalem, also referred to as "James the Just."

The Greek term for bishop is "Episcopoi," from which we get the name of our church. It literally means "overseer" and denotes those who having been ordained priests were set apart to oversee a particular geographic part of the Christian church family. Tradition says the Peter and John selected James to be the chief pastor of the Holiest of cities, Jerusalem, a city which was in conflict in James' day and remains a troubled metropolis with constant conflict with various Christian, Muslim, and Jewish bodies.

The Collect for St. James is found on page 245 of the Prayer Book and I quote it here just in case you might like to pray it on Friday:

"Grant, O God, that, following the example of your servant James the Just, brother of our Lord, your Church may give itself continually to prayer and to the reconciliation of all who are at variance and enmity; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. AMEN.

Lessons and Hymns

Sunday, October 25th Twenty-Second Sunday after Pentecost Proper 25 - Year B

THE SCRIPTURE LESSONS:

The Old Testament: Jeremiah 31:7-9. The Lord God will gather the tribes of Israel to "walk by brooks of water, in a straight path in which they shall not stumble."

The Psalm: Psalm 126. This passage of the Psalter echoes the restoration of Israel in Jeremiah.

The Epistle: Hebrews 7:23-28. Jesus is portrayed as a priest forever because he is the eternal son of God.

The Gospel: Mark 10:46-52. This is the story of Jesus healing the blind beggar Bartimaeus.

THE HYMNS:

Processional Hymn: No. 411. "O Bless the Lord My Soul." This hymn was written by James Montgomery and is based upon Psalm 103. The text has been in our hymnals since 1826 without any alterations over the years. The tune "St. Thomas" was composed by Aaron Williams and is used in its abbreviated form for this hymn. The words call forth our faith in the deepest sense, "O bless the Lord my soul."

Sequence Hymn: No. 671. "Amazing Grace, How Sweet the Sound." "Amazing Grace" is a hymn written by the English poet and clergyman John Newton (1725-1807), published in 1779. It is one of the most recognizable songs in the Englishspeaking world. Newton grew up without any particular religious conviction. He was pressed into the Royal Navy, and after leaving the service became involved in the Atlantic slave trade. In 1748, a violent storm battered his vessel so severely that he called out to God for mercy, a moment that marked his spiritual conversion. "Amazing Grace" was written to illustrate a sermon on New Year's Day of 1773. The tune "New Britain" has been traced back to "Southern Harmony," a shaped note hymnbook published in 1847 published by William Walker which sold 600,000 copies. The hymn is a wonderful testimony of personal faith. "Twas grace that taught my heart to fear, and grace my fears relieved; how precious did that grace appear the hour I first believed."

Presentation Hymn: No. 679. "Surely it is God who Saves Me." Based on the First Song of Isaiah, this popular contemporary hymn was composed by the Rev. Dr. Carl Pickens Daw, Jr., before he studied at the University of the South and was ordained an Episcopal priest in March of 1982. He served on the Committee on Texts for the 1982 Hymnal and currently lives in Watertown, Maine. The tune was composed by Ray W. Urwin.

Communion Hymn: "The Servant Song." The composer and lyricist of this popular hymn is Richard Gillard, born in 1953, in New Zealand, who describes its origin this way, "It was in the first half of 1976 that I wrote verse 3 ("I will hold the Christ-light for you...") but, initially no more than that. It wasn't until one particularly summery Sunday afternoon in December 1976 or January 1977, back in Auckland, that I took that scrap of paper out of my guitar case and began to meditate on that single verse, exploring in music and words all the possibilities that it suggested."

Recessional Hymn: No. 535. "Ye Servants of God." Charles Wesley, the son of Samuel Wesley, was born at Epworth, Dec. 18, 1708. He was educated at Westminster School and afterwards at Christ Church, Oxford, where he graduated M.A. In 1735, he took Orders and immediately proceeded with his brother John to Georgia, both being employed as missionaries of the Society of the Propagation of the Gospel of the Church of England. He returned to England in 1736. For many years he engaged with his brother in preaching the Gospel. He died March 29, 1788. This great hymn calls forth our outreach, sharing Christ with others-a prominent aspect of the Epiphany season. The spirited tune is from a 1765 melody in a German Catholic hymnal.
