Lessons and Hymns

Sunday, January 31, 2016 Fourth Sunday after Epiphany by the Rev. William P. McLemore

THE SCRIPTURE LESSONS:

The Old Testament: Jeremiah 1:4-10. This passage tells the story of the call of God to Jeremiah to be a prophet.

The Psalm: Psalm 71:1-6. This Psalm relates the strength and security that comes from faith in God.

The Epistle: I Corinthians 13:1-13. Here, St. Paul continues his discourse on the Holy Spirit by outlining the fruits of the spirit in Christian love.

The Gospel: Luke 4:21-30. Here, we continue the story of Jesus in his home synagogue at Nazareth, only this time his home folks get angry at his preaching and look to harm him, but Jesus escapes.

THE HYMNS:

Processional Hymn: No. 448. "O Love How Deep, How Broad, How High." The author of his hymn is generally believed to be Thomas a' Kempis, born near Dusseldorf in



1379 into a peasant family. At a young age, he was sent to a pauper's school run by a religious order in which he later became a member as was priested in 1413. He is portrayed in the woodcut with this article. The tune "Deo Gracias," is a 15th English ballad melody and is best sung with spirit and movement.

Sequence Hymn: No. 435. "At the Name of Jesus." This hymn was written by Caroline Maria Noel as processional music for Ascension Day. It is based on Philippians 2:9-10 which speaks of bowing the knee before Christ. Some biblical scholars think that St. Paul himself quoted it from an early Christian hymn. The tune, "King's Weston" was composed by Ralph Vaughan Williams in 1925 expressly for this hymn.

Presentation Hymn: No. 440. "Blessed Jesus at Thy Word." This hymn was written in German by Tobias Clausnitzer (1619-1684) and translated by Catherine Winkworth who was a very notable English song writer and translator. She is also known for her passionate and ardent support of women in higher education. The tune, "Leibster Jesu" is a melody by Johann Rudolph Ahle (1625-1673) and later harmonized by George Herbert Palmer in the early 20th century.

Communion Hymn: No. 301. "Bread of the World in Mercy Broken." This hymn is one of many written by Reginald Heber (1793-1826), an Anglican priest who was named Bishop of Calcutta, India, in 1823, having spiritual responsibility for the English in all of India, until his sudden death from apoplexy, April 3, 1826. We have already sung about a half dozen of his hymns at St. Paul's. The tune, "Rendez a Dieu," is attributed to the 16th century composer, Louis Bourgeois.

Recessional Hymn: No. 569. "God the

Omnipotent." This hymn is actually two hymns written by two different people, Henry Chorley and John Ellerton and joined together by the Society for the Propagation of Christian Knowledge (SPCK) for the Anglican Hymnal of 1871. I love the tune because of its stately movement which isn't surprising because it is the imperial national anthem of Russia-written by Alexis Lvov at the command of Czar Nicholas I in 1933. The tune has been used in many settings, most notably the conclusion of Tchaikovsky's "1812 Overture."


