Thoughts from Lori

Baptism is one of the two rituals commended by Jesus himself, the other being the Lord's Supper (aka Communion, Eucharist, the Mass). Together they are the two great sacraments. Other rituals developed over time giving us the seven sacraments: Baptism and the Eucharist being the first, then Unction (last rites), Ordination, Marriage, Confirmation, and Reconciliation of a Penitent (Confession and Absolution). The early Church recognized baptism as the initiation into the Body of Christ as was required before one could participate in the sacrament of the table; that is, the Supper. That tradition has continued in most, if not all, denominations until very recent times.

Forward Day by Day

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In the past decade, there has been much discussion about this requirement, recognizing that in this day and time when people are so mobile and church membership so much more vague, that many people "enter" the church through Communion before being baptized. Some decry this practice while others welcome it as an expression of God's hospitality. The General Convention in 2015 included some work on this issue, but did not change the canon requiring Baptism before receiving Communion. Meanwhile, here in the trenches so-to-speak, it is as the article says a continuing pastoral issue for parish clergy. How do we continue to treasure and guard the traditions of the Church while representing God's radical acceptance? What is more important - the canons or feeding the flock? (Clearly, I lean toward the latter, even though I see myself as guardian of the institutional church.) It's one of the few times that I find it useful to ask, "What would Jesus do?" The answer to that is, I believe, a no-brainer.

This is particularly sensitive when it comes to children who, for one reason or another, have not been baptized but are coming to church. What message to we want to give them when they come to the Communion rail?

The idea of "open Communion" is not so much about Communion *without* Baptism as it is about Communion *before* Baptism. When I learn that one among us is receiving Communion but has not been baptized, that opens up the opportunity for conversation about the meaning of the Body of Christ; about the identity of being a Christian; and about the responsibilities of membership in the Church which is the Body of Christ. This then can become the path to Baptism.

If all this makes your head spin, welcome to the ever-evolving Church. It has always been thus. Pretend that you are the grand poohbah of the world and decide. Or at least think about it really hard. Then let me know where you land. As for me, I'm just trying to stand in the via media - middle ground (another article, another day) - and represent the Church as I preside at God's table.

Lessons and Hymns

Sunday, March 20, 2016 The Sunday of the Passion / Palm Sunday by the Rev. William P. McLemore

THE SCRIPTURE LESSONS: Theme - "The Glorious Entry of Jesus into Jerusalem."

The Old Testament Reading: Isaiah 50:4-9a. The Prophet Isaiah asserts that in spite of those who criticize him he finds strength in God's presence and help.

The Epistle. Philippians 2:5-11. The Apostle Paul gives a concise and thought-provoking summary of the incarnation of Jesus and our proper response to it-that "at the name of Jesus every knee should bend."

The Gospel: Luke 22:14-23:56 or Luke 23:1-49. It is customary on the Sunday of the Passion/Palm Sunday, to hear the entire story of the crucifixion of Jesus. Each of the three years involves a different Gospel: Year A, Matthew; Year B, Mark; and Year C, Luke. The passion narrative in the Gospel according to John is read on Good Friday all three years. The passion narrative covers Our Lord's entry into Jerusalem and those events leading up to his crucifixion and burial.

THE HYMNS:

Litany of the Palms Hymn: No. 154. "All Glory, Laud, and Honor." This ancient hymn is attributed to Theodulph of Orleans who died in 821 AD. Legend has it that he wrote the hymn while in prison having been convicted on a false accusation. Its use was in connection with the processions of the palms through the towns in that day. The tune was composed by Melchior Teschner (1584-1635) and harmonized by William Henry Monk (1823-1889).

Sequence Hymn: No. 435. "At the Name of Jesus." This hymn was written by Caroline Maria Noel as processional music for Ascension Day. It is based on Philippians 2:9-10 which speaks of bowing the knee before Christ. Some biblical scholars think that St. Paul himself quoted it from an early Christian hymn. The tune, "King's Weston" was composed by Ralph Vaughan Williams in 1925 expressly for this hymn.

Presentation Hymn: No. 439. "What Wondrous Love is This." This is a beautiful American folk hymn, the words and music of which, date back to the early 19th century. It first appears in the "Southern Harmony" of 1835 compiled by William 'Singin Billy' Walker, a shape note and tune book. The book contained 335 songs, went through several editions, and became one of the most popular southern tune-books of the century.

Communion Hymn: "Let the broken ones be healed." This short song is being used for our communion hymn during Lent. It was written by the Rev. Michael Hudson in his "Songs for the Cycle," (c) 2004.

Note: There is no Recessional Hymn this Passion/Palm Sunday.
