

Lessons and Hymns

Sunday, September 4, 2016 Pentecost XVI (Proper 18, Year C) by the Rev. William P. McLemore

THE SCRIPTURE LESSONS:

First Lesson: Jeremiah 18:1-11, Sirach 10:12-18 or Deuteronomy 20:15-20. The Prophet Jeremiah calls for people to "amend your ways and your doings." In Deuteronomy we find Moses explaining the important choices in life and prosperity on the one hand, and "death and adversity" on the other.

The Psalm: Psalm 139:1-5, 13-17 or Psalm 1. The first selection marvels at the amazing knowledge of the Lord God." The second reads, "the Lord knows the way of the righteous, but the way of the wicked is doomed."

Second Lesson: Philemon 1-21. Here, we have 90% of the one chapter writing attributed to St. Paul to his follower, Philemon, to take care of another minister, Onesimus, a converted slave.

The Gospel: Luke 14:25-33. Jesus calls for his followers to make a sacrifice in serving him putting their faith before their possessions.

THE HYMNS:

Processional Hymn: No. 8. "Morning has broken like the first morning." This is a popular and well-known Christian hymn first published in 1931. The text for this hymn was written by Eleanor Farjeon (1881-1965) an English author of children's stories and plays, poetry, biography, history, and satire. It is set to a Scottish Gaelic tune known as "Bunessan," harmonized for the 1982 hymnal by Alec Wyton (1921-2007).

Sequence Hymn: No. 631. "Book of books, our people's strength." One of several hymns in our hymnal written by Percy Dearmer (1867-1936) English hymnodist and priest in the Church of England. He often said he wrote this hymn to express a contemporary appreciation for the Bible: "Light of knowledge, ever burning, shed on us thy deathless learning." The tune, "Liebster Jesu," was composed by Johann Rudolph Ahle (1625-1673) and harmonized by George Herbert Palmer (1846-1926).

Presentation Hymn: No. 482. "Lord of all hopefulness." This hymn was written by Jan Struther (1901-1953), a woman poet and writer, born in London, and for many years she served on the editorial board of the London Times. She died of cancer in New York City on July 20, 1953. Her hymn covers a person's day from morning till bed time. The tune, "Slane," is an Irish ballad melody.

Communion Hymn: "Take me as I am." This tune, composed by John L. Bell, is one of the best-known and often-used songs from the Iona Community in Scotland, having found its way into numerous hymnals, songbooks, and arrangements. The Iona Community is an ancient Christian community on the small island of Iona in the Inner Hebrides Islands of western Scotland. It was founded by St. Columba, a monk from Ireland and missionary to Scotland, in 563 A.D. It became an important monastery in the Early Middle Ages and played a major role in the conversion of the Picts

to Christianity and in the evangelization of Europe. Today, the Iona Community is a place of pilgrimage from all over the world. It has become a major center for ecumenism, social justice, healing, reconciliation, and worship renewal. John Lamberton Bell was born in 1949 in Kilmarnock, Ayrshire, Scotland. He is a hymn writer, minister in the Church of Scotland, and a member of the Iona Community.

Recessional Hymn: No. 541. "Come, Labor On." Miss Jane Borthwick, the translator of this hymn and many others, is of Scottish family. Her sister (Mrs. Eric Findlater) and herself edited "Hymns from the Land of Luther" (1854). She also wrote "Thoughts for Thoughtful Hours (1859), and has contributed numerous poetical pieces to the "Family Treasury," under the signature "H.L.L."
