














Thoughts from Lori

Lessons and Hymns

Sunday, September 25, 2016 Pentecost XIX (Proper 21, Year C) by the Rev. William P. McLemore

THE SCRIPTURE LESSONS:

First Lesson: Jeremiah 32:1-3a, 6-15 or Amos 6:1a, 4-76. The Prophet Jeremiah relates that fields in God's country can be bought again. In Amos the prophet condemns those who pamper themselves with earthly wealth.

The Psalm: Psalm 91:1-6, 14-16 or Psalm 146. The first selection praises God as a refuge and stronghold; the second selection reflects God's search for justice for the oppressed.

Second Lesson: I Timothy 6:6-19. The writer says, "For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil."

The Gospel: Luke 16:19-32. Jesus tells the parable of the rich man and Lazarus-one in Hades and the other in heaven.

THE HYMNS:

Processional Hymn: No. 423. "Immortal, invisible, God only wise." The writer of this hymn, William Chalmers Smith, may have been inspired by I Timothy 1:17, "To the King of the ages, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory forever and ever." The tune, "St. Denio" is based upon a number of Welsh ballads later adapted by John Roberts (1822-1877).

Sequence Hymn: No. 628. "Help us, O Lord, to learn the truths." This hymn was written by William Watkins Reid, Jr. (1923-2009), who earned degrees from Oberlin in 1945 and 1947, and then obtained a degree from Yale Divinity School. He served the Methodist Church not only in local parishes but also through his involvement in annual conferences and membership on various commissions and boards of that denomination. The hymn extols the benefits of studying Holy Scriptures and therefore is in this section of our hymnal. The tune, "St. Ethelwald," was composed by William Henry Monk (1823-1889).

Presentation Hymn: No. 705. "As those of old their first fruits brought." This hymn was written by Frank Von Christierson (1900-1996), a Presbyterian minister who served a number of congregations in California. He is responsible for many popular hymns owned by the Hymn Society of America which holds the 1961 Copyright to this one. Born in Lovisa, Finland, he migrated to the United States and graduated from Stanford University and San Francisco

Theological Seminary. In recognition of his activities as a hymn writer, von Christierson was named a "Fellow of the Hymn Society" in 1982. The tune, "Forest Green," is an English melody adapted and harmonized by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958).

Communion Hymn: "Take me as I am." This tune, composed by John L. Bell, is one of the best-known and often-used songs from the Iona Community in Scotland, having found its way into numerous hymnals, songbooks, and arrangements. The Iona Community is an ancient Christian community on the small island of Iona in the Inner Hebrides Islands of western Scotland. It was founded by St. Columba, a monk from Ireland and missionary to Scotland, in 563 A.D. It became an important monastery in the Early Middle Ages and played a major role in the conversion of the Picts to Christianity and in the evangelization of Europe. Today, the Iona Community is a place of pilgrimage from all over the world. It has become a major center for ecumenism, social justice, healing, reconciliation, and worship renewal. John Lamberton Bell was born in 1949 in Kilmarnock, Ayrshire, Scotland. He is a hymn writer, minister in the Church of Scotland, and a member of the Iona Community.

Recessional Hymn: No. 625. "Ye holy angels bright." This is a composition of the Rev. Richard Baxter (1615-1691), a fiery Anglican priest who was very independent in thought and action. He challenged Oliver Cromwell for declaring himself the "Lord Protector of the Commonwealth of England, Scotland, and Ireland", which, among other things, netted him a two-year prison sentence. He died December 8, 1691 at the age of 76. The tune, "Darwall," was composed by and named after John Darwall to be used singing Psalm 148. It is majestic and beautiful, especially when the last verse is accompanied by the soprano descant.


