Coming to St. Paul's on May 11th

Lessons and Hymns
Easter Sunday, April 16th

THE SCRIPTURE LESSONS:

First Lesson: Acts 10:34-43 or Jeremiah 31:1-6. Acts records Peter's discourse on Jesus; Jeremiah tells of the glories to face the people of Israel after their tribulations.

The Psalm: Psalm 118:1-2, 14-24. This psalm echoes the plight of Isaiah finding strength in God in spite of the "whispering of the crowd."

Second Lesson: Colossians 3:1-4. Paul says, "Set your minds on things that are above."

The Gospel: John 20:1-18 or Matthew 28:1-10. Two versions of the empty tomb.

THE HYMNS:

Processional Hymn: No. 179. "Welcome happy morning." This hymn, along with other Easter music, is the creation of the Italian-born poet, Venantius Honorius Fortunatus (c540-600). It was translated into English by the prolific British hymn writer, the Rev. John Ellerton (1826-1893). The music was composed by Arthur Seymour Sullivan (1842-1900) and is given the name, "Fortunatus," in honor of the author.

Sequence Hymn: "Celtic Alleluia." This was written and composed by Fintan O'Carroll, born July 31, 1922 in Wexford, England. On completion of his secondary school studies, he took up a position as a clerk in the national railway. He won first prize in a traditional music competition, aged 12, playing violin, and went on to study violin at home, taking lessons as the opportunity arose. His heart was in music, and he left his railway position in 1967 after 27 years of service, whereupon he completed his degree at Trinity to gain his Bachelor of Music degree.

Presentation Hymn: No. 180. "He is risen, He is risen!" Cecil Frances Alexander, the wife of a Bishop of the Church of Ireland, wrote this hymn in the late 1800's. She was a prolific poet and wrote nearly 400 hymns and poems. Joachim Neander is the composer of the tune, "Unser Herrscher."

Communion Hymn: "Bless the Lord."

Recessional Hymn: No. 207. "Jesus Christ is risen today." This classic hymn for Easter dates back to a 14th century Bohemian carol. Over the years, it has been continuously altered and the fourth and final verse was written by Charles Wesley. The tune, "Easter Hymn," is from the English, "Lyrica Davidica," published in London in 1708.
