A Word from the Rev. William P. McLemore

Feast Day of Saint Mark

St. Mark is commemorated on Tuesday, April 25th. He is the author of the second gospel, and also known as John Mark. He was the son of Mary of Jerusalem, generally accepted as a wealthy woman with a large home. Some traditions have it that the Last Supper of Jesus was celebrated in an upper room of her house. It is believed that Mark was in the Garden of Gethsemane when Jesus was taken captive. Mark is usually thought to be the "young man" who lost his nerve, and ran away, leaving his clothes in the hands of Jesus' captors.



Later on, Mark went to Antioch with his cousin, Barnabas. He accompanied Paul and Barnabas on their first missionary journey, but again he "ran away." When it came time for a second journey, Paul refused to let him go. Mark became close to Peter, and it is believed that he served as Peter's scribe or secretary. The Gospel of Mark, which bears his name, may be based on the information

reported by Peter during his time with Christ. Mark's final journey was to the city of Alexandria, where he reputedly formed the Christian Church, and became its first Bishop. Alexandria became one of the most important of early Christian communities. St. Mark is often symbolized by a winged lion.

Mark left Alexandria to link up with Paul, and after a while, returned home. However, upon his return, the pagans resented his effort to turn them from their traditional gods, and in AD 68 they placed a rope around his neck, and dragged him through the streets until he was dead. Mark is remembered as an early Christian martyr.

What we learn from this Saint is the struggle we face in our Christian journey--sometimes being faithful, and other times fraught with doubt and uncertainty. But just as this early saint affirmed his faith to the end, we can know that regardless of where we are on our life and spiritual journey, we are never far from God's love, redemption, and forgiveness.

Lessons and Hymns April 30th

THE SCRIPTURE LESSONS:

<u>First Lesson:</u> Acts 2:14a, 36-41. Peter continues his first sermon telling the story of the life and ministry of Jesus.

The Psalm: Psalm 116:1-3, 10-17. "How shall I repay the Lord for all the good things he has done for me?"

<u>Second Lesson:</u> I Peter 1:17-23. Christ was destined before the world was founded to reveal the genuine love of God.

<u>The Gospel</u>: Luke 24:13-35. Jesus meets his followers on the road to Emmaus and has breakfast with them.

THE HYMNS:


<u>Processional Hymn:</u> No. 180. "He is risen, He is risen." Cecil Frances Alexander (1818-1895), the wife of a Bishop of the Church of Ireland, wrote this hymn in the late 1800's. She was a prolific poet and wrote nearly 400 hymns and poems. The hymn not only relates the joy of the resurrection, but calls for witness to it: "Tell it out with joyful voice." Joachim Neander (1650-1680) is the composer of the tune, "Unser Herrscher."

<u>Sequence Hymn:</u> "Celtic Alleluia." This was written and composed by Fintan O'Carroll, born July 31, 1922 in Wexford, England. On completion of his secondary school studies, he took up a position as a clerk in the national railway. He won first prize in a traditional music competition, aged 12, playing violin, and went on to study violin at home, taking lessons as the opportunity arose. His heart was in music, and he left his railway position in 1967 after 27 years of service, whereupon he completed his degree at Trinity to gain his Bachelor of Music degree.

Presentation Hymn: No. 495. "Hail, thou once despised Jesus."

<u>Communion Hymn:</u> "Bless the Lord my soul, and bless God's holy name." This hymn is a 1991 paraphrase of Psalm 103 from the Taize Community in France. It was founded by Brother Roger Schutz, with the goal of "building a life together in which the gospel of reconciliation would be a concretely lived reality." During the war he helps people in difficulty and hosts German refugees. In 1942, the Gestapo threatened to arrest Brother Roger, who fled to Switzerland until the end of the war.

Recessional Hymn: No. 296. "We know that Christ is raised." This hymn is based on Romans 6:3-11, "Just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life." The text was written by John Brownlow Geyer in 1969 and was born in 1932 in Yorkshire, England. The tune, "Engleberg," is a melody composed by Charles Villers Stanford (1852-1924) in 1904. The music meter is 10 10 10 with alleluias.


