This Sunday, June 11th, is Trinity Sunday; the only feast day that celebrates an idea, a theology, rather than an historic event or person. After that, we'll be in the long season of Pentecost, also known as Ordinary Time. Beginning Sunday, the 18th, we will be using an alternate form of The Great Thanksgiving from "Enriching Our Worship."

It's an authorized version of the Eucharistic prayer used in many places throughout The Episcopal Church (TEC). The shape and form of our worship will remain largely the same, including familiar service music, but some of the wording in the Eucharistic prayer itself will be new and different. In order to absorb and get comfortable with it, we'll use this form for at least a couple of months. While your feedback is always welcome, please be open to how the Spirit may speak to us as we experience this slightly new version of our worship.

Saturday, Nov. 4th Ducks-in-a-Row workshop**



A Word from the Rev. William P. McLemore

Feast Day of St. Boniface

The feast day of St. Boniface (675-754 A.D.), Archbishop of Mainz and missionary to Germany, was born in England, and educated at Exeter, and later at Nursling, Winchester, where he was professed as a monk, and ordained to the priesthood. His birth name was Winfred. However, in 719, Pope Gregory II commissioned him to work in Germany, and gave him the name of Boniface.



For the rest of his days, Boniface devoted himself to reforming, planting, and organizing churches, monasteries, and dioceses in Hesse, Thuringia, and Bavaria. In 722, the Pope ordained him a bishop, and ten years later made him an archbishop, and in 743 appointed him to the archdiocese of Mainz.

In 752, with papal support, he anointed Pepin as King of the Franks. Thus, the way was prepared for

Charlemagne, Pepin's son, to become the King, and unify Christian dominion in Western Europe.

In 753, Boniface resigned his position as archbishop to become a missionary to Frisia. Sadly, on June 5, 754, while awaiting a group of converts for confirmation, he and his companions were beset by a group of pagans, and murdered. His body was buried in a monastery near Mainz, which he had founded in 744.

What we learn from Boniface is that evangelism is the foundation of the Christian church. Were it not for the spirit of reaching out to others from the very first time the disciples received the gift of the Holy Spirit, there would be no Christian faith today. Boniface, in the manner of the Apostle Paul, carried the faith of Jesus into a pagan world, which eventually brought about his own death. However, his life and ministry live on in the region of Germany because of his evangelical zeal!

Lessons and Hymns June 11th - Trinity Sunday by the Rev. William P. McLemore

SCRIPTURE REFLECTIONS: The first reading is Genesis 1:1-2:4a, the first words in the Old Testament and the story of creation. There are several choices at the psalter portion: Psalm 8, Canticle 2, or Canticle 13. The Epistle is 2 Corinthians 13:11-13 where St. Paul closes his letter with the formula of the Trinity: "the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit." The Gospel is from Matthew 28:16-20 where Jesus instructs his disciples to baptize in the name of the Trinity, "Father, Son, and Holy Spirit."

THE HYMNS:

PROCESSIONAL HYMN: No. 423. "Immortal, invisible, God only wise." The writer of this hymn, William Chalmers Smith (1824-1908), may have been inspired by I Timothy 1:17, "To the King of the ages, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory forever and ever." He was an ordained minister in the Free Scottish Church reputed to be a man of catholic tastes with a keen and cultured mind. The tune, "St. Denio" is based upon a number of Welsh ballads later adapted by John Roberts (1822-1877).

<u>THE SEQUENCE HYMN</u>: No. 371. "Thou whose almighty word." According to his son, this hymn based on Genesis 1:3, was written by John Marriott around 1813. It was not published during his lifetime, but was quoted six weeks after his death in a speech given to the London Missionary Society. The tune "Moscow" was composed by Felice de Giardini in the 18th century. God's healing is mentioned in the second verse of this hymn, "Thou who didst come


to bring on thy redeeming wing healing and sight, heal to the sick in mind, sight to the inly blind, now to all humankind, let there be light."

<u>PRESENTATION HYMN</u>: No. 362. "Holy, holy, holy." This hymn was written by Reginald Heber (1783-1826) an Anglican priest who became the bishop of Calcutta in 1823 and was given the pastoral care of all of India His image is among those carved into the reredos of our cathedral in Washington D.C. The tune, "Nicaea," was composed by John Bacchus Dykes (1823-1876) whose genius at composition is that not a note of it has been altered since it was composed

<u>COMMUNION HYMN</u>: No. 712. "Dona nobis pacem." These three words are Latin for "Grant Us Peace" and the hymn is an old monastic canon of unknown authorship and composing. As we approach the altar for Holy Communion, we want to pray for peace in our hearts and souls and these words are a wonderful preface to receiving this sacrament.

<u>RECESSIONAL HYMN</u>: No. 365. "Come thou almighty King." Students of hymnody have searched far and wide for the true author of this hymn. Some feel it has the composition style of a Charles Wesley's music. The 1982 hymnal simply calls it "Anonymous" (ca. 1757). The first three verses present each person of the Trinity and the final verse begins, "To thee, great one in three."
