A couple of weeks ago, someone asked me about the words I add during the Eucharist after saying, "The gifts of God for the people of God." "Be what you see. Receive what you are." Those are the words of St. Augustine from one of his sermons. He was referring to the Body of Christ; that the consecrated bread has become for us that very body. It is what we receive. It is what we are. So when that bread, that "Body" is given to you, Augustine says, see that. Be that.

I expect, too, that someone will ask me about the blessing I'm using at the end of the service. "Life is short. We don't have much time to gladden the hearts of those who walk this way with us. So be swift to love and make haste to be kind." It is a quote from the work of Henri-Frederic Amiel, Swiss philosopher and poet (1821-1881). It has become popular in various Episcopal churches and I thought to share it with you for a while.

Today is the official first day of summer, yet given that we're more than half-way through June, it feels (to me at least) that summer is flying by! You are missed when you're not in church on Sunday mornings, but I hope you are enjoying vacations, travel, rest, and refreshment. Be safe and take good care of yourselves. If you go to church when you travel, bring a service program to put on our bulletin board in the parish hall. Or take a picture to post. It could turn into our own little travel log.

A Word from the Rev. William P. McLemore

Feast Day of St. Alban, First Martyr of Britain

The feast day of St. Alban is Thursday, June 22nd. Very little is known about Alban. It is estimated that his death was between 209 to 305 A.D. Tradition has it that he was the earliest Christian in Britain, and its first martyr.

The most we know about Alban rests on the historical writings of the Venerable Bede, who claims Alban lived as a Roman soldier in Verulamium sometime during the 3rd or 4th



century. Bede tells the story that Alban gave shelter to a Christian priest who was fleeing from the persecutors, and was converted to the faith by this cleric. When other Roman soldiers came to Alban's house, he exchanged clothes with the priest, and was tortured and martyred in the priest's stead. The latest estimates are that this occurred in 209 A.D., during the persecution under the Emperor Septimius Severus (193-211 A.D.).

What we learn from Alban is that Christianity had an early beginning in the British Isles, and that it wasn't very easy to practice the faith in that day. We also know that even though Roman soldiers were used to

persecute, many were converted Christians, adding an extra dilemma to their faith. We remember the Roman Centurion at the death of Jesus, "Now the centurion and those with him, who were keeping watch over Jesus, saw the earthquake and what took place, they were terrified and said, 'Truly this man was God's Son!" (Matthew 28:54)


EPISCOPAL VISIT*

Lessons and Hymns June 25th - Proper 7

SCRIPTURE REFLECTIONS: There are two choices for an Old Testament lesson: Genesis 25:8-21 and Jeremiah 20:7-13. Genesis tells about Sarah and Hagar and the son of the slave woman; Jeremiah 20:7-13 finds the prophet complaining about the ridicule he gets in his ministry. Psalm 69:8-11, (12-17), 18-20 finds the psalmist looking for God's compassion. The Epistle is Romans 6:1-b-11 and here St. Paul talks about baptism as it is a death to the old self. The Gospel is Matthew 10:24-39 and here Jesus relates the work of discipleship.

THE HYMNS:

<u>PROCESSIONAL HYMN</u>: No. 524. "I love thy kingdom, Lord." This hymn was authored by Dr. Timothy Dwight (1725-1817) when he was president of Yale College. It is based on Psalm 137 and has been in the Episcopal hymnals since 1826. The tune, "St. Thomas," was composed by Aaron Williams (1731-1776) and later harmonized by Lowell Mason (1792-1872).

<u>THE SEQUENCE HYMN</u>: No. 679. "Surely it is God who saves me." Based on the First Song of Isaiah, this popular contemporary hymn was composed by the Rev. Dr. Carl Pickens Daw, Jr., before he studied at the University of the South and was ordained an Episcopal priest in March of 1982. He served on the Committee on Texts for the 1982 Hymnal and currently lives in Watertown, Maine. The tune was composed by Ray W. Urwin.

<u>PRESENTATION HYMN</u>: No. 334. "Praise the Lord, rise up rejoicing." This hymn was written by the Rev. Canon Howard Charles Adie Gaunt (born 1902), a cleric and teacher at Malvern College, Malvern, Worcestershire, England (1937-1953). The last verse hearkens to Paul's II Corinthians 5:17, "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation." The tune, "Alles ist an Gottes Segen," is a melody attributed to Johann Balthasar Konig (1691-1750) harmonized by Johann Lohner (1645-1705).

<u>COMMUNION HYMN</u>: No. 712. "Dona nobis pacem." These three words are Latin for "Grant Us Peace" and the hymn is an old monastic canon of unknown authorship and composing. As we approach the altar for Holy Communion, we want to pray for peace in our hearts and souls and these words are a wonderful preface to receiving this sacrament.

<u>RECESSIONAL HYMN</u>: No. 530. "Spread, O spread, thou mighty word." This hymn was written by Jonathan Friedrich Bahnmaier and is one of the first hymns to turn from the individual piety of the 19th century to the zeal for foreign missions and education. The present form includes only the first five of the original seven stanzas of the hymn. The tune, "Gott Sei Dank," is a melody taken from the German, "Geisteiches Gesangbuch," (1704) and harmonized by William Henry Havergal (1793-1870).
