A Word from the Rev. William P. McLemore

Feast Day of Saint Mary Magdalene

The feast day of Saint Mary Magdalene is this Saturday, July 22nd. Mary of Magdala, near Capernaum, was one of several women who followed Jesus, and ministered to him in Galilee. he Gospels tell us that Mary was healed by Jesus, followed him, and was one of those who stood by him at Calvary.



It is clear that Mary Magdalene's life was radically changed by Jesus' healing. Her ministry of service and steadfast companionship, even as a witness to the crucifixion, has, through the centuries, been an example of the faithful ministry of women to Christ. All four Gospels name Mary as one of the women who went to the tomb to mourn, and to care for Jesus' body. Her weeping for the loss of her Lord strikes a common chord with the grief of all others over the death of loved ones. As the first witness to the risen Jesus, she is given the charge, "Go to my brethren and say to them,

I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." (John 20:17) As the first messenger of the resurrection, she tells the disciples, "I have seen the Lord." (John 20:18)

What we learn from Mary Magdalene, first and foremost, is the importance of women to Jesus in his life, ministry, and teachings. We also see the importance of service to others, especially the compassionate outreach to the sick, the lonely, and the marginalized. Finally, we see that death is an occasion for love, support, and prayer.

Lessons and Hymns July 23rd - Proper 11

THE SCRIPTURE LESSONS:

The First Reading: Again, the first readings have choices for this Sunday. The first choice is Genesis 28:10-19, Psalm 139:1-11, 22-23; the second choice is Wisdom of Solomon 12:13, 16-19l or Isaiah 44:6-8, Psalm 86:11-17. Genesis tells of Jacob's dream and the ladder. Wisdom of Solomon affirms that God judges with "mildness and great forbearance." Isaiah describes God as "I am the first and I am the last; besides me there is no God."

The Epistle: Romans 8:12-25. Here St. Paul portrays creation as "groaning in travail" and as followers of Jesus Christ we await the adoption by God.

The Gospel: Matthew 13:24-30, 36-43. Jesus tells the parable of the sower who sows good seed but an enemy comes while everyone is asleep and sows weeds and explains that He sows the good seed so be careful of the evil one who sows the bad seed.

THE HYMNS:

PROCESSIONAL HYMN: No. 376, "Joyful, joyful, we adore thee." This hymn was written by a well-known Congregationalist minister, the Rev. Dr. Henry Van Dyke. His son tells the story that his father, while on a preaching visit at Williams College, came to breakfast and placed a manuscript on the table before President James A. Garfield and said to him, "Here is a hymn for you... Your mountains [the Berkshires] were my inspiration. It must be sung to the music of Beethoven's 'Hymn to Joy." As you sing this hymn you will invariably see the magnificent Berkshire mountains in your heart: "All thy works with joy surround thee, earth and heaven reflect thy rays, stars and angels sing around thee, center of unbroken praise. Field and forest, vale and mountain, blooming meadow, flashing sea, chanting bird and flowing fountain, call us to rejoice in thee." Henry van Dyke said of this hymn: "These verses are simple expressions of common Christian feelings and desires in this present time-hymns of today that may be sung together by people who know the thought of the age, age are not afraid that any truth of science will destroy religion, or any revolution on the earth overthrow the kingdom of heaven. Therefore this is a hymn of trust and joy and hope."

SEQUENCE HYMN: No. 542. "Christ is the world's true light." This hymn was written by George Wallace Briggs to express the true nature of Christian mission work. "In Christ all races meet, their ancient feuds forgetting, the whole round world complete, from sunrise to its setting." The hymn reflects the evangelistic aspect of the season of Epiphany. The tune, "St. Joan," was composed in 1941 by Percy E. B. Coller and is named for his wife.

PRESENTATION HYMN: No. 380. "From all that dwell below the skies." This hymn is one of the compositions of Isaac Watts on Psalm 117 which he first published in his "Psalms of David," 1719. With few alterations, it has been in the hymnal of the Episcopal Church since 1826. The tune, "Old Hundredth" by Louis Bourgeois, is the

only tune which has been preserved intact throughout the entire history of metrical psalmody-a real gem of historic church music. Purists insist on singing this hymn slowly and deliberately!

COMMUNION HYMN: "Take, O take me as I am." This is one of the best-known songs from the Iona Community in Scotland which has become a major center for ecumenism, social justice, healing, reconciliation, and worship renewal. John Lamberton Bell, a member of the Iona Community, was born in 1949 in Kilmarnock, Ayrshire Scotland. As you sing the song, you will notice that there are four phases of our faith journey in the text: (1) surrender and conversion, (2) transformation, (3) sealed and marked by God's covenant, and (4) new life together with and in God.

RECESSIONAL HYMN: No. 550. "Jesus calls us, o'er the tumult." This is a hymn for St. Andrew's Day which was first published by the Anglican Society for the Propagation of Christian Knowledge (SPCK) in 1852. It was written by the prolific Frances Alexander, the wife of Archbishop Alexander of Ireland, who is reputed to have written over 400 hymns and poems in her lifetime (1818-1895). The tune, "Restoration," is a melody from "The Southern Harmony," (1835).


