THE FOOD THAT PERISHES



In our Gospel reading this coming Sunday, Jesus says, "Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you" (John 6:27 NRSV). As with all of the teachings and parables of our Lord, he seeks to change our human value system from the earth's world to heaven's world.

The Gospel reading ends with Jesus affirming: I am the bread of life, whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty (John 6:35 NRSV). The gift that Jesus leaves us goes back to Him having the Last Supper with his disciples. He said for them to continue to do the holy meal often as a remembrance of his words and deeds.

Thus, when we receive the bread and wine at communion, we partake of the food that nourishes us with God's love and forgiveness and reminds us that as Christians our value is always God. Just as we seek food for life on this earth, at the Holy Eucharist, we feed ourselves with the deepest symbol Jesus has to offer us by tasting the "Body of Christ, the bread of heaven; and the Blood of Christ, the cup of salvation."

Lessons and Hymns for this Sunday, August 5, 2018 (Eleventh Sunday after Pentecost- Year B) by the Rev. William P. McLemore

THE SCRIPTURE LESSONS:

<u>First Reading:</u> Exodus 16:2-4,9-15. Exodus tells of the feeding by God of the hungry Israelites in the desert with manna from heaven. <u>Psalm 78</u> tells of God's "raining down manna upon them to eat." <u>The Epistle:</u> Ephesians 4:1-16. Paul insists the each person has a unique gift that can help build up "the Body of Christ." <u>The Gospel:</u> John 6:24-35. Jesus tells the people that Moses didn't give his bread, but God's bread and adds, "I am the bread of life."

THE HYMNS:

<u>Processional:</u> No. 522. "Glorious things of thee are spoken." Another majestic piece of music set to Franz Joseph Haydn's tune "Austria," and first played at the birthday of the Emperor Franz II, February 12, 1797, and worded to became the national hymn of Austria. Haydn (1732-1809) created it at the request of its chancellor who wanted an Austrian counterpart to the British, "God Save the King." The hymn itself is based on Isaiah 33:20-21, "Look on Zion, the city of our appointed festivals... But there is the Lord in majesty will be for us a place of broad rivers and streams." It was first published in John Newton's, Olney Hymns, 1779, and has been in the various Episcopal hymnals since 1874. The words, written by the prolific John Newton (1725-1807), son of a shipmaster, who himself became a midshipman in the English Navy. Again, we have a secular tune that directs our witness to the praise and glory of God.

<u>Sequence:</u> No. 631. "Book of books, our people's strength." One of several hymns in our hymnal written by Percy Dearmer (1867-1936), English hymnodist and priest in the Church of England. He often said he wrote this hymn to express a contemporary appreciation for the Bible: "Light of knowledge, ever burning, shed on us thy deathless learning." The tune, "Liebster Jesu," was composed by Johann Rudolph Ahle (1625-1673) and harmonized by George Herbert Palmer (1846-1926).

<u>Presentation:</u> No. 335. "I am the bread of life." The words and music for this very popular new hymn are by Suzanne Toolan and based upon John 6. Toolan, a Mercy Sister, is an internationally known composer of liturgical music. This particular hymn has been translated into 20 languages. She is a prominent American spokeswoman for the music and prayer of the Taize ecumenical community from France and leads many retreats. The Taize Community is a monastic order founded by Roger Schutz in 1940, a Protestant pastor, but includes brothers from both Protestant and Catholic backgrounds. The monastic center is located in Taize, Burgundy, France.

<u>Communion:</u> "Take, O take me as I am." This is one of the best-known songs from the Iona Community in Scotland which has become a major center for ecumenism, social justice, healing, reconciliation, and worship renewal. John Lamberton Bell, a member of the Iona Community, was born in 1949 in Kilmarnock, Ayrshire Scotland. As you sing the song, you will notice that there are four phases of our faith journey in the text: (1) surrender and conversion, (2) transformation, (3) sealed and marked by God's covenant, and (4) new life together with and in God.

<u>Recessional:</u> No. 492. "Sing ye faithful, sing with gladness." The author of this hymn is John Ellerton, born in London, December 16, 1826 and educated at Trinity College, Cambridge. Although an Anglican priest, he is better known as a hymnologist, hymn-writer, and translator. The 1940 Hymnal has 7 of his hymns and this one is new to the current 1982 Hymnal. The tune, "Finnian" was composed by Christopher Dearnley (1930-2000), British organist and composer.
