Human Precepts

In this Sunday's Gospel reading, Jesus quotes the prophet Isaiah, "In vain do they worship me, teaching human precepts as doctrines." Our Lord was ridiculing many of the Jewish dietary and religious customs which they considered important. He teaches that nothing that goes into us can defile; we are defiled by what comes out—what emanates from our human hearts.

In the Lord's Prayer we pray: "Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven." How is it in heaven? We really don't know other than what Jesus teaches us which is that it is the completion of our lives and our entry into God's loving arms--a spiritual place where there is only love and forgiveness. The function of the Christian community on this earth is to be a place where we can learn and practice to be loved and forgiven. The outward and visible (rituals, prayers, communion, etc.) are not so important as the education of our hearts and souls from being despisers and judgers (human precepts) to be lovers and forgivers (God's doctrines).

Lessons and Hymns for this Sunday, September 2, 2018

(Fourteenth Sunday after Pentecost- Year B) by the Rev. William P. McLemore

THE SCRIPTURE LESSONS:

<u>First Readings:</u> Deuteronomy 4:1-2, 6-9. Moses reminds the people to carefully observe the commandments given to them by God. Psalm 15 says "Lord, who may dwell in your tabernacle? Who may abide upon your holy hill?" <u>The Epistle:</u> James 1:17-27. The write of this letter urges the readers to be doers of God's words, not just those who listen and do not act upon them. <u>The Gospel:</u> Mark 7:1-8,14-15,21-23. Jesus is asked why he and his disciples don't obey the traditional rules of the Jewish faith, and Jesus reminds them that moral behavior is more important than obedience to laws that only govern religious practices and rituals.

THE HYMNS:

Processional: No. 7. "Christ Whose Glory Fills the Skies." This hymn was written by Charles Wesley (1707-1786) which he based on Malachi 4:2. "But for you who revere my name the sun of righteousness shall rise, with healing in its wings." The tune, "Ratisbon," is from Johann Werner's "Gesangbuchern," (1815). The present harmony is by William Henry Havergal (1793-1870).

Sequence: No. 660. "O Master Let Me Walk with Thee." This beautiful hymn was the inspiration of another Congregational minister, the Rev. Washington Gladden. The early version could have been inspired by Jeremiah and the Psalmist in today's lessons. Here is a portion of a verse that was later omitted from the hymn: "O Master, let me walk with thee before the taunting Pharisee; help me to bear the sting of spite, the hate of men who hide thy light." In spite of this editorial license, the hymn cries for God to grant patience, forbearance, and slow-ness of heart; as we journey on our walk of faith in life. Dr. Gladden chose this hymn tune by Henry Percy Smith for this hymn and it is best sung with passion and feeling!

Presentation: No. 664. "My Shepherd Will Supply My Need." This hymn is a paraphrase of Psalm 23 by the prolific hymn writer, Sir Isaac Watts (1674-1748). He wrote around 600 hymns, many during the early years of his life (age 20-22) before he entered the ordained ministry as a nonconformist pastor. The tune, "Resignation," is an American folk melody in common meter.

Communion: "Take, O take me as I am." This is one of the best-known songs from the Iona Community in Scotland which has become a major center for ecumenism, social justice, healing, reconciliation, and worship renewal. John Lamberton Bell, a member of the Iona Community, was born in 1949 in Kilmarnock, Ayrshire Scotland. As you sing the song, you will notice that there are four phases of our faith journey in the text: (1) surrender and conversion, (2) transformation, (3) sealed and marked by God's covenant, and (4) new life together with and in God.

Recessional: No. 542. "Christ is the World's True Light." This hymn was written by George Wallace Briggs to express the true nature of Christian mission work. "In Christ all races meet, their ancient feuds forgetting, the whole round world complete, from sunrise to its setting." The hymn reflects the evangelistic aspect of the season of Epiphany. The tune, "St. Joan," was composed in 1941 by Percy E. B. Coller and is named for his wife.
