We will set up the altar with our beautiful blue Advent vestments and set up the Advent wreath and candles. This is also a good time for us to talk about how things are going and answer any questions.



Lessons and Hymns for this Sunday, November 18, 2018

(Twenty-sixth Sunday after Pentecost - Year B) by the Rev. William P. McLemore

THE SCRIPTURE LESSONS:

The Old Testament: Daniel 12:1-3. This passage refers to the Archangel Michael who will arise and exercise judgment of those who "sleep in the dust of the earth" to lead many to righteousness, "like the stars forever and ever." **The Epistle:** Hebrews 10:11-14; Hebrews 10:15-18; Hebrews 10:19-25. Again, the writer continues with the imagery of the Eucharist and the spirit that should prevail as we participate in it. **The Gospel:** Mark 13:1-8. Some people tell Jesus how marvelous the great temple is with such large stones and great size. To which Jesus reminds them, the time will come when the great buildings will be thrown down; and there will be "earthquakes in various places" and famine.

THE HYMNS:

Processional: No. 48. "O Day of Radiant Gladness." This hymn is the first one in Christopher Wordsworth's "Holy Year, 1862." It has been in the Hymnal since 1874. The first line in the 1940 hymnal was, "O Day of Rest and Gladness." Thus it has been altered for this hymnal, including the 3rd verse written by the Rev. Dr. Charles Philip Price (1920-1999), Professor of Systematic Theology at Virginia Theological Seminary, Alexandria, Virginia. Though primarily a hymn for Sundays, it extols the Trinitarian nature of God. The tune, "Es Flog Ein Kleins Waldogelein," is a German folk song which has been harmonized by George Ratcliff Woodward (1848-1934).

Sequence: No. 632. "O Christ the Word Incarnate." This hymn was written by William Walsham How and is based on Psalm 119:105. "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path." This hymn has been in the Hymnal of the Episcopal Church since 1874 but in our current volume, the first line has been changed from "O Word of God Incarnate" to "O Christ the Word Incarnate." The tune "Munich" is taken from a quartet piece in Felix Mendelssohn's "Elijah" (1847).

Presentation: No. 414. "God My King, Thy Might Confessing." This hymn was written by the prolific hymn-writing British Bishop, the Rt. Rev. Richard Mant. It is a paraphrase of verses 1-12 of Psalm 145. Episcopalians today can be happy that the editors of the hymnal have gradually pared the original 14 verses down to 6 (after all – we DO sing all verses of every hymn, eh?) The tune, "Stuttgart," originated with Christian Friedrick Witt and was harmonized in its present form by William Henry Havergal. It is a very traditional English 87.87 meter hymn.

Communion: "In the Lord I'll be forever thankful." This hymn was written and set to music by Jacques Breathier for the Taize religious community in France. 1991. It is based on Philippians 4:4-6.

Recessional: No. 607. "O God of Every Nation." This hymn is new to the 1982 Hymnal and was written by William Watkins Reid, Jr., in 1958. He served as a Medic in the second war and ended the war as a POW in Germany. When he returned to this country he pastored Methodist churches in North Dakota and Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania. He was born in 1923 in New York City and died in 2009. He is listed as one of the great hymn writers who have graduated from Oberlin College including George Calvin Hampton (1938-1984) whose hymn tunes are found in our hymnal. The tune "Llangloffan," comes from a Welsh folk melody.
