Lessons and Hymns for May 19, 2019

(The Fifth Sunday of Easter, Year C) by the Rev. William P. McLemore

THE SCRIPTURE LESSONS:

First Lesson: Acts 11:1-18. This passage tells about Peter describing his vision in Joppa to the circumcised followers of Jesus in Jerusalem. "What God has made clean, you must not call profane." **The Psalm:** Psalm 148. The whole earth and creation praises God. **Second Lesson:** Revelation 21:1-6. God is making all things new, death has been abolished in Christ. **The Gospel:** John 13:31-35. Jesus says, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another."

THE HYMNS:

Processional: No. 296. "We Know That Christ is Raised." This hymn is based on Romans 6:3-11, "Just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life." The text was written by John Brownlow Geyer in 1969 who was born in 1932 in Yorkshire, England. The tune, "Engleberg," is a melody composed by Charles Villers Stanford (1852-1924) in 1904. The music meter is 10 10 10 with alleluias.

Sequence: "Celtic Alleluia." This was written and composed by Fintan O'Carroll, born July 31, 1922 in Wexford, England. On completion of his secondary school studies, he took up a position as a clerk in the national railway. He won first prize in a traditional music competition, aged 12, playing violin, and went on to study violin at home, taking lessons as the opportunity arose. His heart was in music, and he left his railway position in 1967 after 27 years of service, whereupon he completed his degree at Trinity to gain his Bachelor of Music degree.

Presentation: No. 379. "God is Love." This hymn was written by Timothy Rees, the Anglican Bishop of Llandaff, a distinguished speaker in English and Welsh and respected hymnographer. This beautiful hymn covers many aspects of God's love and is appropriate for reflecting on Chapter 13 of St. Paul's letter to Corinth. Cyril V. Taylor composed the tune, "Abbot's Leigh," in May of 1941 when he was working for the Religious Broadcasting Department of the British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC).

Communion: No. 178. "Alleluia, Alleluia, Give thanks to the Risen Lord." This hymn was written by Donald Fishel born in 1950, a graduate of the University of Michigan, and a consummate musician. In a biographical sketch he writes that after college, "I then

embarked on a career in music publishing and began writing the Christian songs for which I am best known. My songs *Alleluia No. 1* and *The Light of Christ* can be found in the hymnals of the Episcopal, Lutheran, Methodist, and Roman Catholic Churches." The tune name is the "Alleluia No. 1" and was composed by him and arranged by Betty Carr Pulkingham (b. 1928), the wife of the Rev. William Graham Pulkingham, an Episcopal priest who lived from 1926-1993.

Recessional: No. 529. "In Christ There is No East or West." This hymn was written by a traveling businessman named William Arthur Dunkerley. He began writing novels and songs as a diversion with the penname, John Oxenham. This particular hymn reflects his deep theology from visiting countries all over the world embracing a God whose Son Jesus Christ brings together East and West, and North and South. The tune, "McKee," was adapted from an Afro-American spiritual by Harry T. Burleigh, a choir member of St. George's, New York City, and is named in honor of his Rector, Elmore McNeill McKee.
