On the Episcopal Relief and Development web page, there are numerous resources for churches experiencing a disaster. One of the resources is a graph entitled Emotional Life Cycle of Disaster. One can clearly see how we process events that we do not want and that disrupt our lives. It begins with the Heroic phase where emotion is high in the prospect of overcoming all. This phase leads to the Honeymoon phase where community cohesion is high and we are "all in this together". After the Honeymoon there is a steady decline in emotional energy as we work through Disillusionment. There is disappointment as the return to normal takes longer and is harder than expected.

We are aware that stay-at-home conditions will very likely last through the month of April. At this time I think it is important that we are mindful of how this extended time apart impacts us emotionally and spiritually. The temptation toward disillusionment is very real. We must be intentional in guarding against it.

Today I took a walk around my garden. Much of it looks like the dead and broken remnants of last year's growth. To my delight, amid the dried leaves, I saw the green shoots of phlox, daisies and even the peonies are sprouting. It was a very real reminder of the promise of life that is unchanging and eternal. This is the deep truth of who we are as the people of God. Our friends, family and neighbors need to hear this Good News. We are the bearers of this news. Friends remember who you are. Remember to whom you belong. Be the light, the love and the hope this world needs.
