With Deacon Deb's permission, I am including a copy of the sermon that she shared with us last Sunday. In this sermon based on the Gospel reading from Matthew 22:15-22, Jesus teaches us "Give to God the things that are God's". Deb goes on to say that the Good News is that we belong to God no matter what is presented to us.

Our faith in God and in our St. Paul's community will lead us through the changes we are facing simply because no matter where and how we worship, we are together, and God is always with us.

Sermon: Matthew 22:15-22 October 18, 2020 Deborah Lang

"Give therefore to the emperor the things that are the emperor's, and to God the things that are God's." Once again, the Pharisees are attempting to manipulate Jesus into condemning himself. This time they bring the Herodians; a fiercely zealous group devoted to the Roman occupation of Judea. They intend to entrap Jesus by forcing him to choose between the tax that is due the reign of the Roman Empire and the fulfillment of the law that is due the reign of God. Theirs was a lose/lose question. Jesus sees through their scheme and calls for the coin used to pay the tax. The coin bears the image and the name of the emperor. Jesus essentially says, if the emperor wants this trinket, let him have it. And then Jesus teaches them...."Give to God the things that are God's."

If a coin that bears the emperor's image belongs to him then what of a human being? A human being created by God bears the image of God. How much more than does a person belong to God? Jesus is saying, Give to God what belongs to God – give to God your all. I believe this is the Good News: We belong to God. No matter what happens, no matter what life throws our way, we belong to God.

I have been reading through vestry minutes written while St. Paul's was a Mission. The first entry date is April 1, 1956. With the exception of the date they could have been written six months ago. There is discussion about differences of opinion regarding liturgy, how to attract new members and how to make-up a budget shortfall. There is even a comment by a priest, and I quote, "We all long for the past and the customs we practiced when we were younger." That was written 64 years ago. It seems that while it may feel like we are in the midst of change and uncertainty; maybe we are really just in the midst of how things are and have always been.

Sixty-four years ago, God brought those intrepid people through the challenges of starting a new church and has brought them through all the challenges since. Why would we ever doubt God's presence with us now? God is and has always been with us. My hope is that we hold on to this truth and know it in our hearts. Our commitment to our church and to our community remains as crucial as ever. Nothing has changed. We are and will always be God's people. Believe it. For Jesus, who bears the face of God, has given us his word.



God asks us to be good stewards with all the gifts he has bestowed upon us. With the continued support of our pledging members, St. Paul's will be able to continue our wonderful church life, ministries of outreach, and many other possibilities at our new home at FUMC.
