Dear all,

As we were unable to be together last week, I thought I would share with you what I had prepared for a homily from Matthew 25:14-30. I believe the message continues to be relevant and speaks to where we now find ourselves.

"I knew that you were a harsh man...so I was afraid."

Fear. What do we fear? In this parable Jesus teaches us how fear can impact our lives. The wealthy landowner leaves three of his servants in charge while he goes on a journey. To each he gives a sum of money to use as they wish for the purposes of maintaining his property. Two of the servants wisely use what they were given and double their investment. The one, who was afraid of the landowner, buries the money and suffers the consequences.

If we view ourselves as the servants and the landowner as God, we can talk about what this parable has to say about all that God has given and how we put our gifts to use. What motivates us to gain more for God or what prohibits us, holds us back from even trying? No doubt the world can be a dangerous place. Fear is a real and powerful emotion that can be quite useful in keeping us safe. Fear is beneficial when we use it as a tool for safety – it is problematic when it becomes a way of life. When we allow fear to inform our decisions and govern our actions, our life becomes no life at all. We become stuck – buried with and in our fear.

The unwise servant was overcome by fear and literally buried his gift along with any chance of seizing opportunity. He let his fear dominate his thinking and way of being. The two wise servants may have also been afraid of the landowner; we don't know. What we do know is they did not let their fear dominate their thoughts and actions. They were able to put fear in its place and by so doing were set free to envision possibility, enjoin creativity and reap the reward. If we allow fear govern any area of our lives how will we ever know what is possible?

Our God is not harsh. Our God is pure love; love that leaves no room for fear. I believe that God has wonderful plans for us. If the past few months have taught us anything it is that God has not lost faith in us. Let's not lose faith in God.

Let's set aside any fear, any doubt and live in the light and freedom of God's unfailing love – and then reap the reward.

Thanks be to God.
