The Gospel reading for this Sunday is the story of the wise and the foolish bridesmaids. We remember that as they are waiting for the Bridegroom to appear, the wise bridesmaids keep their lamps lit and bring extra oil just in case. In the end the foolish and ill-prepared bridesmaids are late to the feast and shut out.

This story has something of a fairytale feel as read on the surface. If we reflect deeper we will find that it has much to tell us of the serious side of our spiritual life. The Bridegroom is symbolic of Jesus Christ and the coming of the Kingdom of God. This is quite clear. The bridesmaids tell us more about ourselves. The bridesmaid is symbolic of our soul, the pure, innocent and radiant part of each and every one of us. As Saint Julian of Norwich writes, the part of us that never has nor ever will consent to sin. The lamps are symbolic of our spiritual life. Our spiritual life is our light; the light by which we see ourselves, our neighbor and the world. This is the light by which we see love. Our lamp, our spiritual life, needs to be fed. It must be cared for and tended. We must keep a reserve to guide us when life gets particularly dark. Our light is cared for through prayer, daily devotions, worship and service to others. Least we be tempted to think the wise bridesmaids selfish for not sharing their oil, consider this - tending to our spiritual life is our life's work; we must do it ourselves. No one can do it for us.

Through the mindful and intentional feeding of our spiritual life we will be prepared. When the Kingdom of God comes, we will be ready in heart, mind and soul to receive it.

With prayerful intention, we are reinventing ourselves with the goal of becoming stronger and a better vision of whom we want to be in the eyes of Christ. This is exactly what we are doing this week as we prepare for our move to First United Methodist Church where we are embarking on a new future. As the community of St. Paul's approaches this new beginning, we will continue to honor all those who came before us by stepping out in faith. Please join us this Sunday, November 8 as we worship together for the first time in our new home. Proclaim the Good News that God is with us as we step out in faith and go forward, just as our Brothers and Sisters in Christ did before us!
