


Coffee and Conversation

For all the Saints

Saint Gregory the Great, 540-604

Of all the popes, Gregory was one whom even the English Church would call Great. Included on the list of his glorious achievements, was his commitment to evangelize the British isle. The son of a wealthy Roman Senator, Gregory studied law in order to change the tide of a crumbling and corrupt Roman empire. Before he turned thirty, he was named Prefect of Rome. Then, suddenly, at the age of thirty-five, he sold or gave away all of his property. He used his wealth to found six monasteries in Sicily and Rome, then converted

his family mansion into a monastery and took the habit of a monk.

• The pope soon called him to serve as one of the seven Deacons of Rome who were in charge of the administration of the Church in the Holy City.

Gregory was then named the papal ambassador to the Byzantine Court.

• In about 586, Gregory was recalled to Rome and returned to the monastery convinced that the future of Christianity lay with monasticism rather than with the declining Roman Empire.

• He asked Pope Benedict I to send missionaries to Britain. When no one came forward, Gregory offered himself to go. When the people of Rome heard of it, such a fuss was raised that Gregory was made to return.

• When Pope Pelaguis died of the plague, the people unanimously chose Gregory as the new pope. Not wishing to be pope, Gregory intended to run away and hide. He was seized and carried off to Saint Peter's Basilica and consecrated to the papal office.

• As pope, Gregory claimed his goal was "not so much to promote the worldly interests of the church as to relieve the poor in their distress and especially to protect them from oppression."

• Gregory's book 'On Pastoral Care' became the primary handbook for bishops and shaped the medieval episcopacy. It was still taught in seminaries in the early 20th century.

• He used the income from papal estates to feed the hungry and forbade the oppression of Jewish people or the seizing of their synagogues. He removed unworthy priests and used the papal treasury to ransom prisoners.

 \cdot Gregory is well remembered for his reforms to liturgical music that has since been known as "Gregorian Chant".

• He sent Augustine and his monks to evangelize England in 595 marking the first truly large-scale mission effort from Rome.

• An Anglican historian wrote, "It is impossible to conceive the confusion, lawlessness and chaotic state of the middle ages without the medieval papacy – and the

real father of that papacy was Gregory the Great."
