ST PERPETUR ST. FELICITY CAMPACIONA CAMP

For all the Saints

Saint Perpetua and her Companions, 181-203

One of the greatest treasures that survives from the very early church is the reliable record of the passion and martyrdom of Perpetua, Felicity and their companions. When Septimus Severus came to the throne in Rome in 198, Tertullian appealed to the new emperor for the toleration of Christians. Severus generally agreed but banned any further conversions to Christianity. In Carthage the following year, as five new converts were preparing for baptism they were arrested. The five included slaves Revocatus and Felicity (expecting the birth of a child),

Saturninus, Secundulus and young Viva Perpetua with her infant child. Saturus, their Christian instructor, refused to abandon them and voluntarily joined them in prison.

- · Perpetua's diary, written during the days leading up to her execution, are the oldest surviving texts written by a Christian woman.
- Perpetua's father, a pagan, repeatedly begged her with tears to renounce her Christian faith saying, "Spare the grey hairs of your father, spare the infancy of your boy, offer sacrifice for the well-being of the emperors."
- · Perpetua wrote in her diary, "When my father in his affection for me was trying to turn me from my purpose by arguments and thus weaken my faith, I said to him, "Do you see this vessel water pot or whatever it may be? Can it be called by any other name than what it is? 'No,' he replied, 'So also I cannot call myself by any other name than what I am a Christian."
- In her diary, Perpetua describes her period of captivity: "What a day of horror! Terrible heat, owing to the crowds! Rough treatment by the soldiers! To crown all, I was tormented with anxiety for my baby.... Such anxieties I suffered for many days, but

I obtained leave for my baby to remain in the prison with me, and being relieved of my trouble and anxiety for him. I at once recovered my health, and my prison became a palace to me and I would rather have been there than anywhere else."

- Perpetua recorded that two deacons, Tertius and Pomponius, arranged for her and her friends to spend a few hours in a more pleasant portion of the prison outdoors.
- On the day of execution, Perpetua and her friends refused to wear the pagan clothing demanded by the soldiers. Perpetua entered the amphitheater singing Psalms.
- Perpetua and Felicity survived being attacked by a bull only to be set upon by gladiators.
- Perpetua cried out "Stand fast in the faith and love one another and do not let our sufferings be a stumbling block to you."
- She and Felicity gave each other the kiss of peace. Perpetua's nervous executioner succeeded only in wounding her with his first stroke, so she guided his sword to her throat and was killed.
 - It can be said that no other saints have been more uniformly honored in every church calendar from the time of their death to the present.


